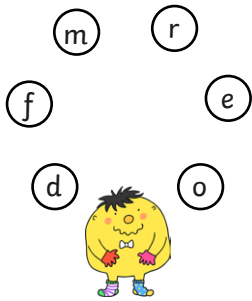


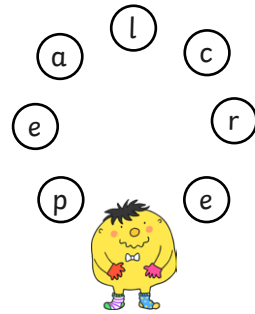
Mr Whoops' Juggling Muddle!
